

Police Eject Garry Davis From Tent on U.N. Grounds

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PARIS, Sept. 17—French gendarmes called by the United Nations ejected Garry Davis tonight from the grounds of the Palais de Chaillot where he had been camping out since Sunday. [He was shortly released after he had been taken to the police station, The Associated Press reported.]

With the Assembly's opening drawing nearer, United Nations officials decided that the crowds drawn by the man who was seeking status as "the first citizen of the world" were becoming a public nuisance. And they agreed that Mr. Davis' pup tent across the street from the main buildings of the Palais came under the category of eyesores.

Early this afternoon Byron Wood, an official from the department of conferences and general services, told Mr. Davis that the French had agreed to extend his expired visa for another three months. Mr. Davis said "no," and that since he had given up his United States citizenship he had no passport to stamp the new visa on, anyway.

The decision to eject Mr. Davis was made right then. Originally it was planned for 6:30 in the evening, but the police waited until two hours later when the crowds around the pup tent had thinned out.
